# Blister Pack Recycling

Many thanks to all those who have carefully saved their pill packets and given them to me for recycling. Please keep it up as you are helping to reduce the mountain of packets that go to landfill. Here is a reminder for those who have not yet brought your packets and for those who are new to our u3a.

I am collecting the packets that contain your tablets. I am not collecting any other form of plastic, foil or aluminium products. The packets are made from plastic and then sealed with a covering of foil. They can come from over the counter products such as paracetamol along with any prescription drugs. Your pharmacist may dispense your tablets in a large



blister pack so that they are sorted by date or time for you and these can be included. Once a month, I take my collection to a lady in Gedling who then takes them to a place in Retford where the plastic and foil are split from each other so that they can be recycled separately. If you can collect some on behalf of friends and family, I am happy to take theirs as well.

I shall be at the back of the room at the Mapperley Social Club at our General Meetings with a large box for you to deposit your saved packets. Please empty your bag into the box and take your bag home with you. I do not wish to collect plastic bags! Some people are unable to come to the general meetings but still wish to recycle their packets. You can give them to me at an interest group meeting that I attend or to someone else to bring for you, or hand them to a member of MaD u3a Committee.

### **Burns Night Supper**


12 MaD members enjoyed a great Burns Night at the home of Maggie and Vic.

# **January's General Meeting**

David Skillen - Knitters, Nailers and Traitors - Belper and the Industrial Revolution Alison Gove-Humphries

I used to travel between
Birmingham and Chesterfield
regularly to visit my in-laws and
always enjoyed going through
Belper as it looked such an
interesting place. My father-in-law
worked for a quarry near there
once. I knew about Arkwright and
Cromford but never realised the
importance of Belper to our
history and the Industrial
Revolution until I heard David's
talk today.

It was a fascinating and wellpresented talk with carefully chosen slides and sprinkled with many interesting anecdotes. Here are just some of the fascinating nuggets of information we learnt from David's talk. Who knew

- that the first knitting frames could only do stocking stitch but not rib?
- that out of the hundreds of nailworkers' workshops in Belper, only one remains?
- that a man from Belper called Samuel Slater (known in Belper as 'Slater the traitor') began the Industrial Revolution in the USA?
- that you can remember which is warp and weft by thinking the weft goes from weft to right?

This small town in Derbyshire literally helped to change the world. One family, the Strutts changed not only Belper but the way we work forever by a series of inventions and innovations. Everyone has heard of James Watt, George Stephenson, Richard Arkwright in relation to the Industrial Revolution but very few have heard of Jedediah Strutt, who was a key player in it.

Belper, with its proximity to the

River Derwent, to ironstone and

trees for charcoal, was the centre for nail making since Norman times. Life was hard for the nail makers who had to buy a bundle of rods at the beginning of the week and make a thousand nails by the end, each one requiring 42 blows of the hammer. During the Industrial Revolution, nail making moved to the Black Country where it was mechanised and nail making died out in Belper.

Since at least the 16th century, men and women all wore stockings. In 1589, the Reverend William Lee of Calverton, fed up with his fiancée continually hand knitting stockings, invented the knitting frame. However, this machine had limitations: it could not knit the ribbing which kept the stockings up. It was Jedediah Strutt of Belper who invented and patented the Derby Rib and became very wealthy as a result. He used this wealth to support other entrepreneurs and to provide work and reasonably good living conditions for the workers of Belper. It was interesting to hear that his knitting frames were used throughout the East Midlands and that you can tell a framework knitters house by a row of small windows at the top of the house. I know there are some such houses off Mansfield Road in Sherwood. David suggested a visit to the Framework Knitters Museum in Ruddington, which sounds like an excellent idea for a U3A outing.

David went through all the textile inventions in the Industrial Revolution from Hargreaves' Spinning Jenny to Crompton's Mule. What I didn't know was Strutt's involvement in financing Arkwright's mill at Cromford where the water frames for spinning were housed.

These mills had a real problem inflammability. Wooden machinery covered in oil, cotton dust and candles were not a good mixture and the mills burnt down on a regular basis. By the end of the 1790s Jedediah had died and passed the firm on to his three sons, George and Joseph who were the businessmen and William the inventor. Belper Mill caught fire in 1803. William Strutt heard about Bage's Flax Mill at Shrewsbury. Built with iron pillars, iron girders and a stone floor, it was arguably the world's first fireproof building. In 18 months, William had had Belper North Mill built in a similar way. It used a water drum as the power source, iron pillars to make the building fireproof, and the use of metal wedges to prevent vibrations from the machinery. The building was warmed by warm air central heating. As it was a tall steel frame building with cladding, it could be claimed it was the world's first skyscraper.

David talked about the effects of the machinery on peoples' livelihoods and their response to it through the Luddites and the Pentrich uprising in 1817. With the introduction of water frames, 68 people could do the work of 4,216 people and workers took to machine breaking to protect their livelihoods. Strutt didn't have problems with the Luddites for a number of reasons including being in charge of the local militia and having a fortified building but also Strutt was a good employer by the standards of the day and encouraged his employees to grow their own vegetables and provided water, gas and electricity to the town. He built a Unitarian chapel and converted the river garden to pleasure gardens which thousands

David finished by telling us about 'Traitor Slater' who worked for Strutt and Arkwright and took their secrets illegally to the USA. Samuel Slater and Moses Brown set up Portucket, the first spinning mill in the USA. President Andrew Jackson called Slater 'the father of American industry.' The influence of Belper and the Derwent Valley has been so profound on the world that it has been designated a World Heritage site; maybe another idea for a day trip? Thank you David for a very engaging talk and to the audience for the lively discussion that followed.



### Check what you can recycle

Nottinghamshire County Council have teamed up with Recycleopedia so that you can find out what day-to-day household items you can recycle and how.

Just enter the item you want to recycle and your postcode and it will tell you which bin to use at home or if you need to take them to a recycling site or request a special collection.

If you are trying to recycle an item that doesn't show on the list, you can let them know on the next page and they will also add it to the list for other people to see.

The Recycling checked - Recycling checker.

If an item isn't listed, you could try searching for it using different key words or by simply reordering them. If you still can't find your item, please use the 'Add My Item' feature and they will find out how it should be recycled in your area and then add it to the database. Please note that this can take up to 14 days to process before it appears on the system
