BOOK GROUP NEWS

Book Group 1 OUR TOP THREE READS THIS YEAR

Our group reads one book every month, these have been recommended by one of the members. We have very eclectic tastes so it makes for a



varied reading list throughout the year. In our December meeting the group voted for the top three books and they are as follows:

Ist Place

"The Paris Library" by Janet Skeslian Charles

This book has two narratives - the life of the elderly French emigrant Odile in small town America, and her earlier life in France during the Nazi Occupation, which is revealed through her unlikely relationship with a troubled teenager. It is a story of love and betrayal at the American Library in Paris which, surprisingly, continued to operate despite the wartime occupation.

2nd Place

"Lessons in Chemistry" by Bonnie Garmus

This book can perhaps be best described as a revenge comedy relating to female disempowerment during the nineteen fifties and sixties. It is unusual, thought provoking, and amusing, and the group felt that the title was a little off putting and meant that most of us would never have read it without it being recommended.

3rd Place

"A Fine Balance" by Rohinton Mistry

Set in India during the time of the State of Emergency in the nineteen seventies, four characters are thrown together by circumstances, becoming unlikely friends. They struggle against relentless corruption and adversity, the political system working against them to reinforce the inequalities which prevent their diligence and enterprise getting their just rewards. This is a lengthy but gripping novel and very memorable.

There are two Book Groups in Mapperley U3A, both of which are currently full, but starting a Book Group is an easy way to meet new people and does not require the organisational skills of some of the other groups as no money and only minimal planning is required. Many U3As have more specific groups such as Crime Fiction or Non Fiction so a new group could be tailored to exactly what you would like!

Play Going - Playhouse

Hothouse Tickets

For a number of years now we in the MaD u3a have enjoyed Nottingham Playhouse Hothouse performances.

We have experienced some fantastic professional theatre at substantially discounted prices.

So, we were very sorry to learn only last week that owing to the Council having to cut a grant of £60,500 to the Playhouse they are no longer able to offer the Hothouse scheme.

The scheme will finish in January 2025 and the pantomime is therefore the last performance they can offer us at Hothouse prices.

However, there is the Playhouse Community Club scheme which is offered to charities and, where eligible, will offer some discounted performances. It is unlikely that the discounts offered will be as generous as the Hothouse performances but will be below the normal box office price.

We have applied to the Playhouse to join the Community Club and are waiting to hear whether or not our application fits their criteria and has been successful. Once we have a response, we will let you know via the newsletter.
