### **Theatre Royal Tour**

Our guide to the tour of Nottingham Theatre Royal was a Victorian actor-Ezekiel Bone!\* His knowledge of the theatre and its history was prodigious, with hardly a moment between delivery of each available fact!

The theatre was designed by Charles J Phipps and was built by the Lambert brothers, Lace manufacturers. The first production was Sheridan's '*The School for Scandal*' which opened on 25 September 1865. In 1897 the theatre was remodelled by Frank Matcham, and the work included building new dressing rooms, and balconies without supporting pillars.

Ezekiel took us onto the stage to view the auditorium, which originally held over 2000 people - now it can hold nearer 1200. The stage itself can be enlarged by removing the first two or three rows of seats.

The theatre made history with the World Premiere of '*The Mousetrap*' in 1952. It was again remodelled and extended between 1976 and 1978, reopening on 6 June 1978.

Ezekiel took us back stage, which is a large area, and on one side, where once the County Hotel stood, is an enormous space which can cope with two lorries being driven in through an extremely large door.

All in all, it was a super tour, conducted by an excellent host, who is also known as Robin Hood, or in reality, Ade Andrews.\*

The Grade II listed building was constructed in 1877 and was in use as a music hall until 1914. Following that it has been occupied as storage warehouse, an Italian restaurant, and a coffee shop.

With funding from the Heritage Lottery and other sources it's original music hall beauty has been restored.

It had to close in 2018 and it was a difficult and uncertain time for the building until Nottinghamshire YMCA stepped in to save the venue, which is now run by a charitable trust.

All bar and kitchen operational surplus is donated to the work of the YMCA Robin Hood Group. Probably one of the few bars in the county where you will find coffee and cakes at one end of the bar and beer pumps at the other end.

### **MaD Growers**

The MaD Growers, part of the original gardening group, met for the first time this month. Based on a questionnaire completed by members of the group there was a clearly defined 50:50 split between those preferring to keep the group in it's original format and those who wished to increase their skills and knowledge of gardening, and this new group was formed from this split. Unfortunately no one has offered to run the original gardening group so they have not yet been able to start monthly meetings. However, visits to open gardens arranged by the MaD Growers will be opened up to include the original group too.

Eleven members of this new group had a very enjoyable meeting. One thing we talked about doing is an idea from the Gardeners World magazine called 'Make a metre matter'. The magazine suggests different ways to use approximately one square metre to make a difference to the biodiversity of our plot. Some have expressed a desire to make a dedicated patch for pollinators, a pond or wildlife habitat and we decided that, if space is lacking, a pot will suffice. We will share some of our results later in the year.

Another new idea is a regular 'What's looking good in the garden this month'. We shared photos of plants in our gardens that are looking good at the moment. We had some beautiful photos - hellebores featured very highly but the group chose Chionodoxa to highlight for the March newsletter which was put forward by Glenis whose description is :



A beautiful small flower to cheer up the garden at the start of spring. Purchased in a small bulb pack a couple of years ago, they happily pop up each spring. Apparently it spreads itself quite easily so there should be more to look forward to in the future.

## Art Appreciation

**S** ome of our members took the opportunity to attend one of the showings of *The Dawn of Impressionism.* Filled with actors reading the artists' own words, the film concentrated solely on the first exhibition as their momentous breakaway from the Salon and the staid art establishment of the day. A narrow focus, but an interesting angle on perhaps the most popular and influential movement which paved the way for artistic freedom and innovative ideas. I personally was not fully aware of all the exhibitors, only a few of the famous paintings exhibited, nor of those paintings by established accepted artists invited to give the exhibition respectability. A surprise to many in the cinema I think!

At our meeting at the end of March, however, we looked at Artists and their Mums, as Mothering Sunday was close by. We covered a wide selection of artists in different countries over an historic timescale as well as contemporary artworks, and from different movements. Artists both familiar and also perhaps unfamiliar - arresting, and even surprising, depictions were viewed, alongside information on their often very different relationships with their mothers.

## March's General Meeting

## The Nottingham's Royal Garden - Martin Stott

n March, many of us turn our thoughts to the outside and gardening so it was a delight to hear Martin tell us about a jewel in Nottingham's crown the garden at Bromley House Library. Martin, a former BBC journalist, gave us an entertaining and humorous talk with excellent visuals.

Bromley House Library's setting is a Georgian town house on Angel Row. It is easy to walk by and miss it, but if you get the chance it is well worth a visit.

The house itself was built in 1752 by George and Mary Smith. Mary had royal connections, being related to James I and Prince Rupert - this is why Martin feels that the garden could be named The Royal Garden.

George Smith owned Smith's bank and his house was literally 'above the shop' - the banking hall. After a scandal involving George and Mary's son, the house was finally sold in 1820 to the Nottingham Subscription Library, a private members library, for £2,750. A loan from Smith's bank helped them finance it.

Bromley House was the intellectual heart of the city until the University was opened, and has a lovely interior with a spiral staircase and its own Meridian line. The library is thriving today. It has 50,000 books and 1,700 members. The librarians buy 1,000 new books every year.

Bromley House garden is one of the rarest Georgian town gardens in the country. There are two parts to the garden - the courtyard garden and a raised pleasure garden. Comparisons with a similar garden discovered in Bath proves its authenticity - an oval centre surrounded by York stone paving and three large circular beds. The garden looks tired at present but it has many original features, including two stones engraved with the initials of George Smith. One of the finds was a Georgian brick complete with thumbprint!

Because it is so rare, a garden conservation team is currently working on its restoration and conservation, but they face a huge challenge. Bromley House Library has never had a lot of money: even when it was first founded they had to rent out rooms to make ends meet. In the past they have also sold off some of their richest assets, like rare books.

The plane trees planted in 1875 are lovely but their leaf fall and roots are causing big problems, lifting up paving. Many slabs are cracked and the concrete is uneven. Walls need repair and the oval path needs new gravel. But, they have had some help. Four years ago they received a £24k donation from the Lady Hind trust and that has now increased to £60k.

They have had lots of surveys done and thought carefully about the planting of it.

Martin has enlisted the voluntary support of some of the best historical experts in the country - people like Todd Longstaffe-Gowan, Gary Thorogood-Page and Ann Treneman of the Times as well as rose experts. Martin shared the concept design with us and I expect many of us are now looking forward to the opportunity of seeing the garden.



If the new plans become a reality, the garden is the first thing you will see as you enter the house. It will be wheelchair friendly, have lighting and there will be a big garden room where meetings can be held. It will also have a disabled access toilet.



This is a very expensive project but it has a very noble aim - to reference the past, reinforce the spirit of the place, yet respond to today's needs and consider future generations. Above all, to make it more accessible to all Nottingham people. Bromley House are seeking further grants and also fundraising.



# The cost of stamps to rise yet again

Royal Mail has announced that on 7 April the cost of a first-class stamp will rise by 5p to £1.70, and that of a second-class stamp by 2p to 87p.

The company said the decision carefully considered "balancing affordability with the increasing cost of delivering mail".

Citizens Advice described the change as "yet another blow to consumers", and said the change to the second class price was "unjust".

The number of letters Royal Mail delivers has fallen from a peak of 20 billion in 2004-05 to 6.6 billion last year. However, the price of stamps has continued to rise. Since 2022, Royal Mail has already hiked the cost of a firstclass stamp five times from 85p to £1.65.

## Two Nottingham bakeries named in top 50 list of Britain's best

Two of Nottingham's best bakeries have been included on a list of the top 50 across Great Britain. The Good Food Guide has revealed the top spots for bread and cakes in celebration of the nation's bakery boom.

The list is the product of expert on-the-ground knowledge from the Good Food Guide's network of anonymous inspectors, plus hundreds of miles covered on the hunt for the freshest, flakiest croissants and the most flavoursome slow-proved sourdough loaves.

And the two Nottingham bakeries, both loved by customers who describe the food as 'stunning' and 'exceptional', are **Small Food Bakery** at Seely Road, Nottingham, and **Tough Mary's Bakehouse** on Derby Road, Nottingham (opposite the cathedral) ... and we have our local artisan bakery, Coosh Micro Bakery on Breckhill Road which, whilst not being named in the top 50, sells delicious bread and is well worth a visit!

## **E-Scooters return to Nottingham streets**

An official trial of e-scooters has returned to Nottingham after the previous operator went bust.

The Old Market Square and The Park Estate are among the new 'no-go zones' which have been created as e-scooters return to Nottingham. The city council confirmed that it would be working with operator Dott to create several 'no-go' and 'low-speed zones' to improve the safety of its e-scooter trial.

Around 1,300 e-scooters were available to hire across Nottingham again from 26 March and the city council has now confirmed all the areas in which usage will be restricted. As well as the Old Market Square and The Park, the city council has also created no-go zones through the Victoria Centre and The Exchange.

## Work started on new River Trent bridge

Work has started on Nottingham's first bridge over the River Trent in more than six decades, which the council is aiming to be open by spring 2026. Although a mini-stroke isn't a full stroke, the symptoms are very similar. With a mini-stroke these symptoms go away completely within 24 hours. However, it is still an important warning sign your chance of having a major stroke in the future has increased. It can be a signal that you're about to have a full stroke, so you should take immediate action.

Spotting the signs of a mini-stroke is crucial for getting medical help and advice. This can significantly reduce your likelihood of future episodes and the chance of a more serious stroke.

## Might Aspirin stop cancers from spreading?

Scientists believe they have discovered how the cheap painkiller aspirin can stop cancers from spreading.

In animal experiments they showed that the drug enhanced the ability of the immune system to fight back.

The team at the University of Cambridge said it was an exciting and surprise discovery that could eventually lead to cancer patients being prescribed the drug - but not yet, and people are advised against just taking the pills themselves.

Regular aspirin comes with risks and trials are still trying to figure out which patients are most likely to benefit.

Tantalising data from more than a decade ago showed people who were already taking a daily aspirin were more likely to survive if they were diagnosed with cancer.

Police forces and local councils have aired warnings about scam QR codes continuing to catch motorists out.

Quick Response (QR) codes are those black and white patterned squares you scan with a smartphone, which then direct you to a website. They have become a popular tool for scammers, with reports to Action Fraud about all QR code scams, not just parking, more than doubling in 2024 to 1,386.

These nasty scams can convince you to scan a dodgy QR code with your phone to pay for parking, only to sting you with a monthly subscription trap after gathering your personal and financial details.

Eleven local councils and police forces have taken to social media recently to share warnings far and wide about QR code scams appearing.
