In March we visited The Falcon Inn at Canning Circus. Built in 1853 by 1864 it was a fully licensed establishment. Previously tied to Shipstones it is now a freehouse.

Our April get together is The Angel Microbrewery right in the heart of the Lace Market. The Grade II listed building was originally two houses and dates from around 1800. It serves beer from its own on site brewery as well as guest beers. The first floor Old Chapel has been converted into a performance area. Some of the bands that have played there before they became well known include Oasis, Kasabian and the Arctic Monkeys.

German Conversation and Culture Group – Joy Brown

Six of us met on Tues 21st April. Two articles from Nachrichten Leicht were read, translated and discussed. Firstly, one about plans by the German Government to reduce fuel tax in the wake of the economic crisis caused by the war in Iran. Several options were being considered, including reducing the cost by 17 cents and also one whereby companies would voluntarily pay their employees a one-off sum of 1000 Euros. Both of these met with some criticism.

The second, more light-hearted article, was about the re-introduction of Lynx in the Harz mountains and surrounding forests. Having been re-introduced in several other areas including the Black Forest, Bavarian Forest and Palatinate areas. Conservationists are pleased the Lynx numbers are now increasing in the Harz region.

Essen was our study verb this month and a variety of interesting sentences were read out.

Our usual, light-hearted, chat, mostly about history of our surrounding area and Lace making in Nottingham followed, whilst enjoying coffee and biscuits.

Our next meeting will be on 26th May when we will be visiting the Lace Market Theatre to see Ein Komisches Talent.

Art Appreciation – Jo Wilson



A huge variety of unusual media were looked at this month from the more bizarre- blood and meat (eg Marc Qunn, Vincent Castiglia) and liquid cheese (Cosimo Cavallaro) to the relatively new genre of Land Art, originating in the late 60's/early 70's, featuring artists such as Andy Goldsworthy and Jon Foreman. From large scale works, like Edoardo Tresoldi (wire mesh architectural structures) and Tara Donovan (Styrofoam cups, index cards and paper plates) to the

miniature world of Willard Wigan (the eyes of needles), Salvat Fidal (pencil nibs) and 'Lito' (leaf cutting), we explored a considerable range of works, some making socio-political statements of ecology and consumerism, like Ha Shult's trash people army. It was important to convey the artistry of body art and lack of AI or photographic trickery by showing videos where the illusion unfurled via the painted models (Johannes Stoetter and Trina Merry at the top of the game in this genre), or indeed work 'drawing' with steel wire to create the artwork once a light source hit it (Larry Kagan)- seeing in motion was key to believing. And, of course, the successful tromp d'oeil artist Guido Daniele's hand art captivated us all.



Chewing gum, mosaics (using wine corks, coffee beans and screws), toilet rolls, soot, wine stain portraits, bank notes, obsolete computer components, film video and audio tapes, laundry and parcel and sticky tapes to name just a few more media, were all included.

April Speaker Report – Elaine Lindley

The River Trent - England's Heart

At the general meeting on the 23rd April, Mike Burton spoke regarding the River Trent, from its source on Biddulph Moor in Staffordshire to its discharge into the River Humber. Mike is a former journalist and history teacher.

The Trent was, and to some extent still is, regarded as the border between the North and South of England. In Roman times, those living south of the Trent were more easily controlled whilst those in the north more quarrelsome. During the industrial revolution, northerners were the leaders in protests for better standards of living and working conditions.

The Trent and its valley have influenced industry through the counties of Staffordshire, Derbyshire and Nottinghamshire. Those industries were the force behind the creation of a waterway from Liverpool to the Humber, via canals - and the Trent when it became navigable. The Trent valley was also home to several power stations none of which are still operating. They were all located on the northern side of the Trent!

The Trent valley has always been prone to flooding. In 1770 the flooding was so bad that most of Lincolnshire was under water. In Nottinghamshire, several sporting venues are located along the Trent. The landlord of the Trent Bridge Inn opened a cricket field behind the inn and charged the sum of sixpence for admission to watch matches. This gave rise to the Trent Bridge test ground that we know today. After leaving Nottinghamshire, the river flows through agricultural Lincolnshire before arriving at its entry into the Humber.

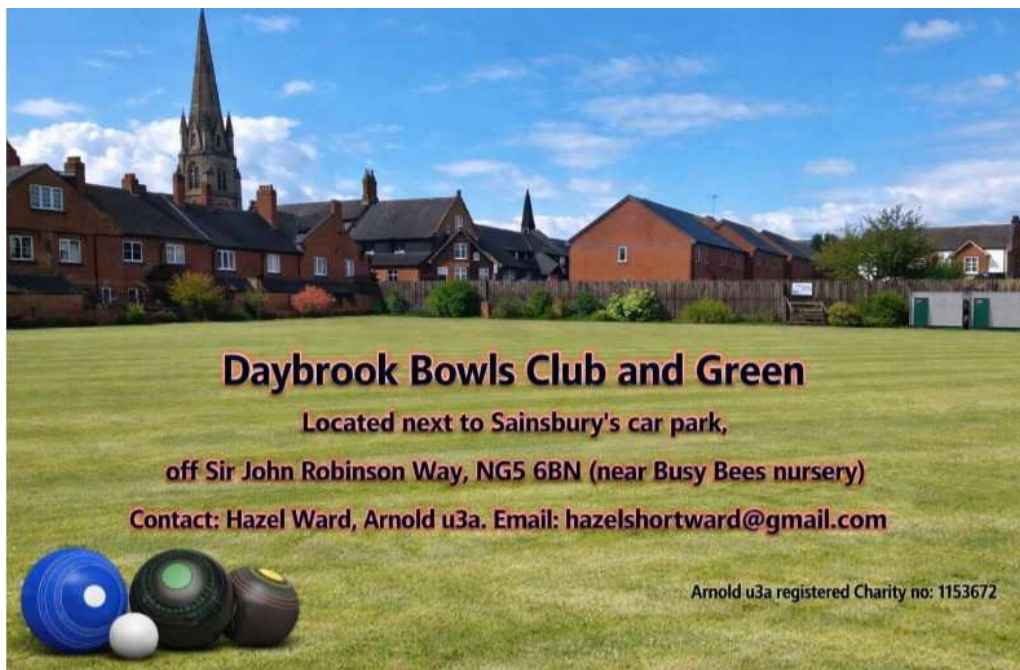

What on earth is supercritical carbon dioxide and do you care?

This is part of a series of talks from leading university research groups at The University of Nottingham and Nottingham Trent.

Friday 8th May 2026, 1pm University of Nottingham, Jubilee campus

What on earth is supercritical carbon dioxide and do you care?

Well, you might care if you learnt how this research expertise could help ensure that the shampoos, conditioners, cleaning agents and cosmetics of the future are totally degradable. At the moment the thickeners and detergents in them are not, and those wastes are starting to damage our environment.

Or how can we solve the problem of recycling crisp packets more easily. Currently recycling is difficult because crisp packets are a complex mix of polymers, inks, adhesives and aluminium layers – all designed to keep your crisps fresh and tasty - but difficult to recycle.

You will hear from two leading researchers working on these problems and their collaboration with major companies like Croda. The researchers are part of the Polymer chemistry department at the University of Nottingham. Led by Professor Steve Howdle, and with over £7m funding from government and industry, the department has a world leading reputation in the use of supercritical carbon dioxide technology and how it can be used to help solve these important societal problems.

See an amazing sustainable building complete with a grass roof!

Afterwards, you will be given an exclusive tour of the labs and the building - the GSK Carbon Neutral Laboratory. Located on the University's Innovation Park, the building provides unrivalled facilities for chemistry with the building itself being a focus for sustainability. It incorporates the latest technologies to allow it to be carbon-neutral over its lifetime through the use of natural materials and a grass roof!. The energy required to run the laboratory is met by renewable sources such as solar power and sustainable biomass.




